Senator Bill Rabon swore in Commissioners Richard Edwards, District 2 Governor Appointee, for a term ending June 30, 2021, and Landon Zimmer, President Pro Tempore Appointee, for a term ending June 30, 2017.

Chairman Clark called a short recess so that photographs of new Commissioners could be taken. The meeting reconvened at 9:20 am.

MINUTES

On a motion by Garry Spence and second by Nat Harris, the Commission approved the August 27, 2015 Wildlife Resources Commission Minutes, presented in **Exhibit C**. The Minutes are hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

FINANCIAL STATUS REPORT

Lindsey Riddick, *Budget Analyst*, presented the financial status report on the Wildlife Operating Fund and the Wildlife Endowment Fund as of August 31, 2015 in **Exhibit D**. The Operating Fund balance was \$14,048,843.95. The Endowment Fund balance was \$114,094,688.13. Expendable interest was \$20,328,943.12. Riddick reported that for FY 2015-16 there is an agency reduction of \$3,090,990.00 of which \$1 million is a non-recurring reduction that will be covered with cash on hand. **Exhibit D** is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Executive Committee Meeting Report – Chairman John Litton Clark reported that the Executive Committee met on October 21, 2015. Erik Christofferson, Deputy Director of Operations, provided an overview of the Lake Mattamuskeet Lodge. In 2006 Congress conveyed the lodge and 6.25 acres to North Carolina, under the Department of Cultural Resources. The Wildlife Resources Commission was invited to restore the facility, which will be used as an educational facility. The agency entered into a Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Cultural Resources and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Mark Williard, Architect, oversees the facility restoration. Williard discussed the construction of the building in 1915 as a pump station. Later from 1937 to 1974 the building was a lodge. Since the lodge was conveyed to the State, inadequate funding has resulted in the renovation project not being completed. Funding is being sought, an initial business plan has been presented, and Legislators will be invited to a two-day event to promote the heritage of the Lodge.

Small Game and Wild Turkey Committee Meeting Report — Chairman Garry Spence reported that the committee met with a large crowd in the first floor auditorium on October 21, 2015. Mike Fies of the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries presented a program about Virginia fox preserves that were built in the 1980s. Virginia has 36 preserves; North Carolina has five times as many. Fies stated that the fox preserves provide quality foxhound training opportunities. He discussed the requirements for holding gray and red foxes only and stated that the number taken in preserves is only 4 percent of the average fox harvest. The agency was directed by the Virginia Legislature to make improvements in management after controversy with the Humane Society of the United States. Numerous studies and surveys have improved the management of fox preserves and Field Trials. Under a 2014 compromise with HSUS, fox pens will be phased out over 40 years, stopping after July 1, 2054. North Carolina has fewer regulations than Virginia does.

Chris Kreh, *Upland Game Bird Biologist*, presented an overview of a proposed turkey gobbling chronology study. The study will research the effect of timing of the spring turkey season based on gobbling activity and breeding. Acoustic recorders will be used in a pilot project in the spring, prior to their use statewide.

<u>Land Use and Access Committee Meeting Report</u> – Tom Berry, *Chairman*, reported that the Land Use and Access Committee met in the Commission Room on October 21, 2015. The committee reviewed four Phase I properties and will recommend that the WRC approve staff working with the State Property Office and funding partners to develop acquisition plans for the properties. The Committee then reviewed four Phase II land acquisition proposals. The committee will recommend that the Commission approve the properties for acquisition.

Discussion was held about decreasing funding from Pittman-Robertson funds. The Committee requested that staff prioritize the potential acquisitions for the best use of the limited funds.

The Cleveland County shooting range is scheduled to have a ribbon cutting in January 2016. There has been no action by the WRC on a proposed Burke County shooting range.

<u>Fisheries Committee Meeting Report</u> - Tim Spear, *Chair*, reported that the Fisheries Committee met on October 21, 2015. Christian Waters reviewed the request by the Community of Todd to be added as a Mountain Heritage Trout City.

Bob Curry, *Inland Fisheries Division Chief*, provided an update on Whirling Disease, a parasitic disease that is affecting some trout populations in the Watauga River. Information about the disease will be presented to Fisheries Chiefs throughout the southeastern states.

Discussion was held about management issues at Lake Mattamuskeet, including nutrient loading, aquatic vegetation, and defective gates. There is frustration about the lack of interest by the USFWS in lake level management. Cindy Dohner, USFWS, plans to meet with Gordon Myers and several Commissioners at the SEAFWA Conference in Asheville to discuss management of Lake Mattamuskeet. The Fisheries Committee instructed staff to explore options for lake level management, including transfer of the Lake to the State of North Carolina.

Christian Waters discussed the possibility of stocking red drum at Lake Hyco as a management tool for tilapia populations, as well as a recreational fishing opportunity. In a project with NCSU, historic water quality data is being collected at Lake Hyco. Public meetings will be held to determine whether there is an interest in stocking triploid red drum.

Joint Big Game and Habitat, Nongame and Endangered Species Committee Meeting Report – Neal Hanks, Big Game Chairman, reported that the joint committee met on October 21. Justin McVey provided an update on the status of elk in North Carolina. Discussion was held about consideration of an elk hunting season from October 1 to November 1, by permit only.

David Sawyer provided an update on the 2014 bear harvest. The 2012 Bear Management Plan was adopted by the WRC, using regulated hunting to achieve and maintain bear population objectives. In 2014 rules were passed allowing the use of unprocessed food by still hunters. New bear seasons were created in Piedmont counties and in Robeson County. Sawyer's presentation included harvest data in 2014, when the mast crop was the second highest ever. 2015 mountain bear harvest is ongoing and so far there is a huge increase in bear harvest with the use of dogs. Sawyer stated that data is collected now on an annual basis with the development of the bear E-stamp in 2014.

Several attendees expressed concern that the bear population in eastern North Carolina is too high and that the Commission needs to evaluate options to address these concerns.

<u>Committee of the Whole Meeting Report</u> – John Litton Clark, *Chair*, reported that the Committee of the Whole met on October 21. New Commissioners were welcomed. Commissioners Tom Berry, Tommy Fonville and Garry Spence were sworn in by Margo Minkler, *Notary Public, Enforcement Division*.

Rules proposals to be considered at state-wide public hearings were discussed, with a recommendation that they be approved at the Commission meeting on October 22.

Gordon Myers recommended that the Commission adopt an additional meeting on December 10, with a Commissioner orientation on December 9.

Bob Curry gave a brief update on the SEAFWA meeting that will be held in Asheville. Cindy Dohner and David Viker of the USFWS will meet with Gordon Myers and Commissioners on November 3 in Asheville, regarding management of Lake Mattamuskeet.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT - LAW ENFORCEMENT PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

The Commission received an update about Law Enforcement Professional Standards from Lieutenant Sam Craft, *Law Enforcement Division*. The agency developed an Internal Affairs Department with a position created for Professional Standards Lieutenant. Craft stated that his responsibilities include protecting the credibility of the agency and law enforcement officers, assisting in standardizing forms and procedures, and investigating allegations of criminal conduct or egregious policy violations. In-service training includes review and adjustment of policies as needed. Craft stated that the Farm Act of 2015 requires Law Enforcement to report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety by March 1, 2016, and he will be involved in that process.

HABITAT CONSERVATION UPDATE

Shannon Deaton, *Habitat Conservation Section Chief*, provided an update about recent activities of the Habitat Conservation Section. The program works with towns and cities and developers to provide information about conservation of wildlife habitats. Deaton stated that the Wildlife Action Plan revision will be submitted to the USFWS by September 25, 2015. Deaton thanked Neuse Sport Shop for their donation of tee shirts and stated that the business is a long-time supporter of wildlife diversity.

WILDLIFE EDUCATION UPDATE

Kris Smith, Wildlife Education Division Chief, provided an update about the activities of the Wildlife Education Division. Smith announced that the 2016 Wildlife calendar was awarded first place by the Association for Conservation Information. Magazine Editor Interviews are being scheduled. Other recent activities include the first collegiate archery competition, FFA Camp that was held at White Lake, National Hunting and Fishing Day which involved 800 participants who came out in bad weather for the event, and outreach with the "Back in the Woods Again" program providing the use of track chairs for handicapped sportsmen.

INLAND FISHERIES

Fisheries Update

Bob Curry, *Inland Fisheries Division Chief*, provided an update about the activities of the Inland Fisheries Division. Curry stated that Atlantic sturgeon in the Roanoke River are being fitted with transmitters in collaboration with the Division of Marine Fisheries. Curry stated that a Trout Health meeting was held in Asheville.

Community of Todd - Mountain Heritage Trout City Request

On a motion by Tim Spear and second by Brian White, the Commission approved a request by the Community of Todd, presented in **Exhibit E**, to be recognized as a Mountain Heritage Trout City and to recognize the Delayed Harvest Trout Waters section of the South Fork New River adjacent to Todd Island Park as Mountain Heritage Trout Waters. **Exhibit E – Community of Todd Mountain Heritage Trout City Request**, is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN FISHING REGULATION FOR 2016-2017 RECOMMENDED BY AGENCY STAFF FOR PUBLIC NOTICE AND PRESENTATION AT NINE PUBLIC HEARINGS

Bob Curry presented in **Exhibit F-1** the following proposed changes in inland fishing rules for 2016-2017 to take to state-wide public hearings in January 2016. Tim Spear made a motion to approve the proposals. Nat Harris seconded. The motion carried. **Exhibit F-1** is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

Trout

1) Modify the lower boundary of Delayed Harvest Trout Waters on the Ararat River in Surry County, adding approximately 1.2 miles of Public Mountain Trout Waters. The designated reach will be the portion of the Ararat River adjacent to the Ararat River Greenway in Mount Airy.

15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters

2) Modify the lower boundary of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters on the East Prong Roaring River in Wilkes County, removing approximately 1.3 miles of Public Mountain Trout Waters. The designated reach will be from the Stone Mountain State Park lower boundary to the S.R. 1002 bridge.

15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters

- 3) Clarify that the portion of Three Top Creek located on Three Top Creek Game Land in Ashe County is classified as Hatchery Supported Trout Waters.

 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 4) Clarify the upper boundary of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters on Savannah Creek in Jackson County. The designated reach will be from Shell Branch to Cagle Branch. 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters

Black Bass

- 1) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for black bass in Lake Chatuge (Clay County) by increasing the daily creel limit from 5 fish to 10 fish in aggregate, decreasing the minimum size limit for Largemouth Bass from 14 inches except that two fish less than 14 inches can be retained in the daily creel to 12 inches with no exception, and removing the minimum size limit of 14 inches for Smallmouth and Spotted Bass.

 15A NCAC 10C.0305 Black Bass
- 2) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for black bass in Lake Hampton (Yadkin County) by allowing no Largemouth Bass between 16 and 20 inches to be possessed. The daily creel limit will remain 5 fish, and the minimum size limit will remain 14 inches except that two fish less than 14 inches can be retained in the daily creel.

15A NCAC 10C.0305 Black Bass

3) Modify the exception to the general statewide regulation for black bass in the New River in Alleghany County downstream of Fields Dam (Grayson County, Virginia) by increasing the slot limit of 14 to 20 inches with only one fish greater than 20 inches to a slot limit of 14 to 22 inches with only one fish greater than 22 inches. The daily creel limit will remain 5 fish.

15A NCAC 10C.0305 Black Bass

Crappie

1) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for crappie in Lake Chatuge (Clay County) by implementing 30-fish daily creel limit. There is no minimum size limit.

15A NCAC 10C .0306 Crappie

2) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for crappie in Lake Hampton (Yadkin County) by implementing an 8-inch minimum size limit and a 20-fish daily creel limit.

15A NCAC 10C.0306 Crappie

Striped Bass and Bodie Bass (Hybrid Striped Bass)

1) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for Striped Bass and Bodie Bass in Lake Chatuge (Clay County) by increasing the daily creel limit from four fish to 15 fish in aggregate, removing the minimum size limit of 20 inches, and allowing only two fish greater than 22 inches to be retained.

15A NCAC 10C.0314 Striped Bass

White Perch

1) Prohibit transport, possession or release of live White Perch in waters in and west of Haywood, Buncombe, and Rutherford counties.

15A NCAC 10C.0319 White Perch

Blue Catfish

1) Establish an exception to the general statewide regulation for Blue Catfish in Lake Tillery, Lake Wylie, and Mountain Island Reservoir by allowing only one fish greater than 32 inches to be possessed in the daily creel.

15A NCAC 10C.0401 Manner of Taking Nongame Fishes: Purchase and Sale

Atlantic Sturgeon

1) Designate Atlantic Sturgeon as State Endangered when found in inland fishing waters and remove Atlantic Sturgeon from the State Special Concern list. The scientific name of Atlantic Sturgeon will be updated to match currently accepted nomenclature.

Equipment

 Add dip nets when used in conjunction with a licensed hand-crank electrofisher where authorized by local law to the list of equipment that can be used to take nongame fish for bait or personal consumption in inland fishing waters with an inland fishing license.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

Wildlife Management Update

Dr. David Cobb, Wildlife Management Division Chief, presented an update about the activities of the Wildlife Management Division. Cobb stated that the Division has been providing technical guidance to private landowners on a variety of issues. There has been collaboration on seventy projects, providing biological and human dimensions information. Currently the division is involved with 36 research projects, including management of cervids on the Albemarle Peninsula, the Urban Bear Study, the home range of painted buntings, NCSU study of huntable land, and collaboration between the WRC and UNC on the restoration of submerged aquatic vegetation in Lake Mattamuskeet.

2016-2017 RULE PROPOSALS FOR HUNTING, TRAPPING AND OTHER REGULATED ACTIVITIES FOR CONSIDERATION AT STATE-WIDE PUBLIC HEARINGS

- 1) Allow hunting of alligators under the following conditions:
 - The season for American alligators is from September 1 to October 1.

 equipment and artificial lights. Firearms shall only be used to dispatch American
 alligators that are restrained.

- 1) Hunting is limited to any landowner or member of the landowner's family, or any Pursuant to S.L. 2015-144, allow hunting on Sundays with firearms on private lands with the following restrictions:

 - Hunting on Sunday between 9:30 A.M. and 12:30 P.M. is prohibited, except on controlled hunting preserves licensed pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 113-273(g).
 - Hunting of migratory birds on Sunday is prohibited.
 - The use of a firearm to take deer that are run or chased by dogs on Sunday is prohibited.
 - Hunting on Sunday within 500 yards of a place of worship or any accessory structure thereof, or within 500 yards of a residence not owned by the landowner, is prohibited.
 - Hunting on Sunday in a county having a population greater than 700,000 people is prohibited (currently Wake and Mecklenburg counties).

Note: This proposal pertains only to hunting on Sundays with firearms. It does not affect current rules allowing hunting on Sundays with archery equipment.

Applying to Specific Game Lands

1) Allow youth to hunt in managed waterfowl impoundments from ½ hour before sunrise until sunset on the two youth waterfowl days following the end of the regular waterfowl seasons.

2) Prohibit the use of dogs for pursuing or taking foxes during the period of March 15 through July 15 on Bladen Lakes State Forest Game Land in Bladen County.

6) Remove posted Archery Zones from the permit requirement for hunting turkeys on Harris Game Land.

7) Designate Holly Shelter Game Land as a 6 day per week game land and restrict dog hunting for deer and bear to Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays, except as otherwise authorized by permit on the Bear Garden Tract of Holly Shelter Game Land.

15A NCAC 10D .0103 Hunting on game lands

8) Allow geocaching on Holly Shelter and Stones Creek Game Lands during closed seasons and on closed days for taking bear, deer, turkey and waterfowl.

15A NCAC 10D .0103 Hunting on game lands

9) Expand opportunity for raccoon and opossum hunting on the J. Robert Gordon Field Trial Area, which is currently limited to open days from the second Monday before Thanksgiving through the Saturday following Thanksgiving, to include all open days from sunrise Monday on or nearest October 15 through the last day of February.

15A NCAC 10D .0103 Hunting on game lands

10) Establish Texas Plantation Game Land in Tyrrell County as a Permit Only game land. 15A NCAC 10D .0103 Hunting on game lands

Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief) : This 24 acre tract shares approximately 0.45 miles of boundary with the Saltworks tract of the Carteret County Game Land. It is predominately high quality salt marsh, but has ~0.6 miles of sandy beach at the confluence of Core Creek and the Newport River. The tract supports a WRC Wildlife Action Plan Priority habitat and will provide valuable habitat for reptiles, amphibians, waterfowl, shore and wading birds, and furbearers (see attached table).

According to the NC Conservation Planning Tool, 88% of the acreage in this tract has a biodiversity index of 7 out of 10 (1- low-10 high values) and the remaining 12% has a value of 8 out of 10. The Biodiversity/Wildlife Habitat Index prioritizes aquatic and terrestrial habitat, landscape function, and connectivity.

Additional Comments: The greatest value of this tract to WRC is that it will allow a 254+ acre burn unit to be incorporated into our prescribed burning program without the establishment of a 0.5 mile long firebreak through high quality salt marsh. This would more than double the acreage we can burn without plow lines on the Saltworks tract and make it logistically feasible to burn using aerial ignition, lowering our overall costs





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): Resources are typical of the Three Top Mountain area, with Appalachian oak forest predominant. The lot is part of the nationally significant Three Top Mountain Natural Heritage Area. Three Top Mountain GL was purchased in 1993 as a failed development. Unfortunately a number of lots had already been sold in this failed development. WRC has made it a priority to purchase private lots that are embedded in the main GL property or those that reduce property fragmentation around the GL perimeter. The main interest in acquisition of the Lambb Lot is to solidify WRC ownership and remove a private inholding within the game land. WRC acquisition will also alleviate the potential for a future request for landowner access across the game land to this lot. If acquired, the main management objective will be adding this acreage to the game land.

Common game species found on Three Top Mtn. Game Land include wild turkey, black bear, white-tailed deer, ruffed grouse, raccoon, and gray squirrel. WAP priority species likely found as either permanent residents or transients are indicated in the table below.

This circumstance is not unusual, as not all of the lots and correct ownership for this failed development is available from online tools provided by Ashe Co. If approved for acquisition, Mr. Lambb is aware that verification of ownership will be required.

The shapefile provided is an approximation of the lot location based on comparison of the development plat with 1993 aerial imagery.

Preliminary estimate of five-year stewardship expenditures is limited to surveying 750 feet of property line at approx. \$1.25/foot for a total estimated cost of \$937.50.





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): The Little Macedonia Tract is located in Brunswick County, approximately 2.41 miles northwest of Supply, 8.6 miles southwest of the temporary Bolivia Depot and 3.2 miles southeast of the state-owned Juniper Creek Game Land. The tract represents an excellent location to construct a depot facility for the Bolivia crew.

The site is 261 acres and contains two agricultural fields, a small pond and cutover woodlands. The site contains sandy well drained soils that should be suitable for depot construction. The site does not support county water or sewer, but judging from homes in the area, it should support a suitable well and septic system.

In addition to a depot site, the tract is large enough to potentially allow development of a dove field and could provide limited deer and small game hunting. The tract is bounded on the east south and west by a small creek and pocosin and contains considerable topography. The property is primarily uplands that have been cutover. Currently, there is no marketable timber on the property.

The tract supports NCWRC Wildlife Action Plan Priority habitats (early successional with the potential to restore dry longleaf pine) and species and will provide valuable habitat for reptiles, amphibians, neo-tropical migrants, white-tailed deer, wild turkey, small game, and furbearers.

Access to the property is via a state road (Little Macedonia). The interior of the property contains a network of unimproved sandy roads that provide administrative access and with improvement could provide public access points.

Based upon data found in the NC Conservation Planning Tool, the Little Macedonia Tract's Biodiversity index ranges from 0-4. Approximately 10% of the site is ranked as a 1 and 10% ranked as a 4 with the balance of the tract being assessed as a 0 (1- low-10 high values). The Biodiversity/Wildlife Habitat Index prioritizes aquatic and terrestrial habitat, landscape function, and connectivity.

Additional Comments: Suitable, reasonably priced land for depot construction in Brunswick County is difficult to locate. This tract is located close to all areas the Bolivia crew currently services. The temporary depot the Bolivia crew is working out of is currently adequate but its future is uncertain. This tract offers an opportunity to develop a permanent location from which this crew can work.

Although additional evaluation is necessary to confirm, the site may also represent potential to develop a shooting range.





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): These three small tracts are adjacent to the Odell Tract of Embro Game Land. The owner has approached WRC about accessing these three tracts to conduct future timber harvests. Access to these tracts (deeded or "negotiated") would be through WRC game land property on existing GL roads, across WRC game land property on old public roads (that no longer exist) or "through the woods" on WRC game land property (roads that would need to be built). In lieu of those options, the owner would prefer to sell the properties to the buyer that inherently has the best existing access. WRC has the best inherent access to these three properties. Acquisition of these tracts will eliminate the encumbrance of access that WRC currently bears for these three tracts and will create a more regular shaped boundary line on this portion of the game land.

A final timber harvest was conducted on these tracts in 2000. These areas were replanted in 2001 to loblolly pine at a rate of approximately 400 trees per acre. Although some seedling mortality was experienced on the lower and wet reaches of the tracts, a viable, mostly pine stand with some mixed hardwood areas exists today. No structures exist on the property. Access to the tracts would be on existing game land roads and trails.

Four hundred feet of an unnamed tributary crosses the southeast corner of Tract 1. This tributary drains into Reedy Creek through existing game land property to the south. Acquisition of these properties will protect additional significant aquatic habitat resources that occur in the areas downstream of these tracts.





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): Acquisition of this property is significant as part of the total management project being carried out in the Sandy Mush area. Acquisition of the Tweed tract is particularly significant since it would connect existing smaller tracts of Sandy Mush Game Land that are currently isolated. In a broader sense, WRC ownership of the tract will help ensure ecosystem integrity at the landscape level by increasing connectivity of lands in conservation ownership such as Pisgah National Forest, Sandy Mush Game Land (WRC holdings), Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy lands and various private holdings that are in conservation ownership or have conservation easements that are located in the vicinity. WRC ownership will help reduce land fragmentation as well.

Appalachian Highlands Conservancy

A small portion of the tract is forested with Appalachian oak, Appalachian cove, and Southern Appalachian Low Elevation Pine forests, while the majority of the tract is early successional open fields. Management objectives will include restoring or maintaining the priority wildlife habitats, such as early successional and shortleaf pine, that are located on the tract. The Wildlife Action Plan identifies early successional habitats as priority habitats. The openness of the Tweed Tract is ideal for quality early successional habitat restoration. Common wildlife species found on the tract include quail, grouse, wild

turkey, white-tailed deer, and gray squirrel. Priority species likely to occur on the tract are identified in the attached table.

The Tweed tract is immediately adjacent the Sandy Mush Game Land and has over 3000 feet of public road frontage providing excellent access. Public recreational opportunities will include hunting, hiking, bird watching, photography, and general nature study. Educational opportunities may exist as priority wildlife habitats are managed for or maintained.

Additional Comments: The Tweed Tract is identified in the Sandy Mush Game Land Management Plan as a Level 1 priority tract for acquisition. Level 1 gives this tract a high priority for acquisition.

The Tweed tract is located off of Martin Candler Road and adjoins a small, existing tract of game land. Acquisition of the Tweed tract would enlarge this existing tract and connect it to the larger tract of the Sandy Mush Game Land, thus alleviating the complexities of the boundaries at this location.

Mr. Tweed has shown a willingness to sell portions of this tract. Acquisition will eliminate additional fragmentation in this immediate area, thus protecting existing habitats and corridors that are currently occupied by a wide array of wildlife.

Preliminary estimates of five-year stewardship expenditures include marking/maintaining 2 miles of property boundary (\$400), installing 5 gates (\$5,000) and developing 1 small parking area (\$1000) for a total estimated cost of \$6,400.


Public Service Company of North Carolina (PSNC) currently has a gas line easement on a portion of Green River Game Land in Polk County and plans to replace the existing pipeline in the near future (see attached map for general project location). The work will occur within the footprint of the existing pipeline. However, the current easement document does not specify the easement location or width of the easement area. PSNC Energy would like to rectify this situation by amending the current easement document to specify the easement location and width (see attached "State Amended and Restated Easement"). The prosed amendment identifies a total of 0.21 acres of permanent easement within five locations along our game land boundary.

PSNC Energy has also requested a temporary easement immediately adjacent to the permanent R/W location to facilitate pipeline construction activities and storage of materials, equipment, and vehicles (see attached "NC State Temporary Easement"). Detailed drawings are included in the above legal documents. The temporary easement area requested totals 1.84 acres.

Planned work will generally occur along the boundary between the game land and several private properties. PSCN Energy will be responsible for re-establishing any marked game land boundary that is destroyed as a result of the pipeline replacement. Otherwise, WRC staff has reviewed this request and has determined that it will have no adverse effect on Green River Game Land.

Staff recommends seeking WRC approval to amend the existing permanent easement and to also grant approval of the temporary construction easement request.





Know all men by these presents that for and in consideration of the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and other valuable consideration paid to **State of North Carolina** ("*Grantor*", whether one or more), the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, Grantor hereby conveys unto **PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY OF NORTH CAROLINA**, **INCORPORATED**, a South Carolina corporation d/b/a **PSNC ENERGY**, and its successors and assigns ("*PSNC*"), a temporary and exclusive easement for pipeline construction activities and storage of materials, equipment, and vehicles related to the initial construction of PSNC's pipeline facilities on land adjacent to or near the lands of Grantor, or in which Grantor has an interest, situate in Cooper Gap and White Oak Township, Polk County, North Carolina, as described in that instrument recorded in Book 226, Page 1813, Polk County Registry ("*Grantor's Land*"). The easement granted herein shall be located as shown on **Exhibit A** attached hereto and incorporated herein (the "*Easement Area*").

PSNC shall have all rights necessary and convenient for exercising the rights granted herein, including, but not limited to, the right of ingress and egress over and across the Easement Area and Grantor's Land for access to and from the Easement Area and the right from time to time to cut all trees, shrubs, and undergrowth, and to clear other obstructions located within the Easement Area. In exercising the right of ingress and egress outside of the Easement Area granted herein, PSNC shall use its best efforts to cause the least practicable interference with Grantor's use of Grantor's Land and use existing roads and driveways to the extent reasonably practicable. PSNC shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations in exercising the rights granted herein.

No permanent installation will be made within the Easement Area, and all materials and improvements placed by PSNC within the Easement Area shall be and remain the property of PSNC and shall be removed upon completion of the project. 



15A NCAC 10F .0347(a)(5) – City of Havelock Application for No Wake Zone Slocum Creek

The City of Havelock in Craven County submitted an application and a certified Resolution requesting that the NC Wildlife Resources Commission promulgate rulemaking for an amendment to 15A NCAC 10F.0347, to establish a no wake zone on a portion of Slocum Creek.

Staff investigated and found that the no wake zone is necessary to mitigate hazards created by motorboats entering and exiting Slocum Creek at the boat ramp at the U.S. 70 bridge. The City of Havelock is building a kayak/canoe launch northeast of the ramp. Paddle boat enthusiasts in the narrow and winding waters northeast of the ramp, with limited sightlines, create the need to reduce motorboat speeds for a distance of approximately 1650 feet as shown on the attached map.

Staff therefore recommends Commission approval to submit the Notice of Text highlighted below in the *North Carolina Register* for at least 60 days, with one public hearing as required under the Administrative Procedure Act. After the comment period has ended, the proposed amendment will be brought before the WRC for consideration of adoption.

15A NCAC 10F .0347 CRAVEN COUNTY

- (a) Regulated Areas. This Rule applies to the following waters in Craven County:
 - (1) that portion of Northwest Creek between the entrance buoys at Fairfield Harbour Marina and the mouth of Spring Creek, and to all of Spring Creek, including the bulkheaded area of Fairfield Harbour, in Craven County;
 - (2) that area of water between the entrance buoys of the Olde Towne Lake, from the Trent River and including all of Olde Towne Lake and the bulkhead area of Olde Towne Harbour itself;
 - (3) Matthews Point Marina. That triangular portion within 300 feet on either side and 150 feet straight off of the main pier at Matthews Point Marina located on Clubfoot and Mitchell Creeks, at the end of SR 1711 in the Harlowe area of Craven County;
 - (4) that area of water within 50 yards of the fuel dock at Eastern Carolina Yacht Club; and
 - that portion of Slocum Creek in the City of Havelock, shore to shore east of a line from a point on the northern shore at 34.89122 N, 76.92302 W to a point on the southern shore at 34.89102 N, 76.92304 W and extending northeast, shore to shore to a line from a point on the northern shore at 34.8937 N, 76.92109 W to a point on the southeast shore at 34.89358 N, 76.92089 W.
- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate any vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Green Springs Boys Club Swimming Area No person shall operate a vessel within the Green Springs Boys Club Swimming Area along the Neuse River as designated by marker buoys and float lines.
- (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Board of Commissioners of Craven County is hereby designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing this Rule, Subparagraphs (1), (2), (3), and (4) of this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.
- (e) The City of Havelock is hereby designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing Subparagraph (5) of this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

The proposed permanent amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0347 (APPENDIX 1) establishes one no wake zone on a portion of Slocum Creek in the City of Havelock, Craven County.

The City of Havelock made formal application to the Wildlife Resources Commission requesting a no wake zone on a portion of Slocum Creek shore to shore, beginning at the boat ramp at the U.S. 70 bridge northeast for a distance of approximately 1650 feet.

The Commission reviewed the application and believes that the no wake zone is necessary to mitigate safety hazards created by motorboats entering and exiting a portion of Slocum Creek northeast of the boat ramp. The City of Havelock is building a kayak/canoe launch northeast of the ramp. Paddle boat enthusiasts in these narrow and winding waters, with limited sight lines in the highlighted area of Slocum Creek, create the need to reduce motorboat speeds in the area.

The City of Havelock will mark the no wake zone and purchase and maintain the buoys at a cost of no more than \$2,000.

State Impact Analysis: None.

Local Impact Analysis: The City of Havelock will purchase, place and maintain the buoys to mark the no wake zone, at a cost of no more than \$2,000.

Substantial Economic Impact: There will be no substantial economic impact to the public.

 - that portion of Slocum Creek in the City of Havelock, shore to shore east of a line from a point on the northern shore at 34.89122 N, 76.92302 W to a point on the southern shore at 34.89102 N, 76.92304 W and extending northeast, shore to shore to a line from a point on the northern shore at 34.8937 N, 76.92109 W to a point on the southeast shore at 34.89358 N, 76.92089 W.
- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate any vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Green Springs Boys Club Swimming Area No person shall operate a vessel within the Green Springs Boys Club Swimming Area along the Neuse River as designated by marker buoys and float lines.
- (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Board of Commissioners of Craven County is hereby designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing this Rule, Subparagraphs (1), (2), (3), and (4) of this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.
- (e) The City of Havelock is hereby designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing Subparagraph (5) of this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.
