Wildlife Resources Commission meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. in the Commission Room at Wildlife Resources Commission Headquarters in Raleigh. Clark reminded everyone that the meeting audio is being streamed live and will be available on the Wildlife Resources Commission website. He asked everyone to silence cell phones. Commissioners Garry Spence, Neal Hanks, Mike Johnson, and Tommy Fonville were absent.

Commissioner Richard Edwards led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Commissioner Landon Zimmer gave the invocation.

WELCOME AND MANDATORY ETHICS INQUIRY

Chairman John Clark welcomed guests present. Chairman Clark advised the Commission of the mandatory ethics inquiry as presented in the agenda.

MINUTES

On a motion by Nat Harris and second by Joe Budd, the Commission approved the August 25, 2016 Wildlife Resources Commission minutes, presented in **Exhibit A**. The Minutes are hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

ADMINISTRATION

Financial Status Report – Lindsey Riddick, *Budget Director*, presented in **Exhibit B** a financial status report on the Wildlife Operating Fund and the Wildlife Endowment Fund as of August 31, 2016. The Operating Fund cash balance was \$13,196,652.27. The Endowment Fund balance was \$119,536,361.16. **Exhibit B** is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

2016-2017 Allocation of Endowment Fund Investment Returns – The Commission reviewed Exhibit C, a proposed formula for the allocation of Endowment Fund investment returns. Under a separate formula adopted by the Commission on May 18, 2007, one hundred per cent of the interest earned from magazine lifetime subscriptions is allocated to the magazine budget. The 2016-2017 magazine allocation is \$164,429.76. On a motion by Wes Seegars and second by John Coley, the Commission adopted a Resolution that establishes the annual Wildlife Endowment Fund Allocation formula based on a three-year average Return on Investment of the fund, excluding income proceeds from the sale of Infant Lifetime Sportsman or Youth Lifetime Sportsman Licenses until the respective holders of such licenses attain the age of 16 years. The expendable interest for the 2016-17 fiscal year is 3.56% based on the new formula. The Resolution is incorporated by reference into the Minutes.

2016 GOVERNOR'S AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE - Executive Director Gordon Myers recognized law enforcement officers Teresa Beasley, David Descourouez, and Isaac Hannah, who received the 2016 Governor's Awards for Excellence. The Governor's Award for Excellence acknowledges outstanding contributions toward enhancing the quality and morale of the workplace or creating a better public image of state government. On a freezing day in January 2016, the officers discovered a homeless veteran who had been living out of his car for almost a week. They found shelter and food for the man, likely saving his life.

<u>EMPLOYEE SERVICE AWARDS RECOGNITION</u> – *Executive Director* Gordon Myers presented service awards to WRC employees Kenneth Knight – Wildlife Management, 30 years; George Norris – Land and Water Access, 25 years; Brian Smith – Engineering, 20 years; Emilio Estrada – Education, 10 years; and Zachary Scott – Engineering, 5 years.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Land Use and Access Committee Report - Tom Berry, Chair, reported that the LUAC met on October 5, 2016. Isaac Harrold, Lands Program Manager presented six Phase I land acquisition requests and five Phase II acquisition requests for discussion. The committee discussed a cooperative farm lease on the J. Morgan Futch Game Land in Tyrrell County. The committee discussed a possible acquisition of Cumberland Farms in Fayetteville. The committee directed staff to negotiate an option for a purchase agreement.

Habitat, Nongame and Endangered Species Committee Report – Mark Craig, Chair, reported that the HNGES Committee met on October 5, 2016. Shannon Deaton and Todd Ewing introduced the 2016 state species listing proposals with the goal of determining eligibility and criteria for state listings. On December 12 and 13, 2016 the HNGES Committee will meet to review potential changes in the state listings for endangered, threatened, and species of special concern, including factual information and scientific and economic data. In February 2017, the Wildlife Resources Commission will consider Rule changes for listing to be presented at public hearings. In August 2017, twelve draft Conservation Plans will be presented for species with pending Federal petitions and which share habitats with other listed species.

Small Game and Wild Turkey Committee Report – Brian White, *Vice Chair*, reported that the Small Game and Wild Turkey Committee met on October 5, 2016. The Committee received the final report of the first year turkey gobbling study. 22,000 hours of gobbling were recorded in large areas with little or no hunting. Twice as many gobbles were recorded in the southeastern part of the state, most before sunrise. Next year all Districts will be surveyed with a goal of determining the appropriate seasons statewide.

Committee of the Whole Report - Chairman John Litton Clark reported that the Committee of the Whole met on October 5, 2016. Among the discussions and updates were a review of bear forums, a Mountain Heritage Trout City designation, all rules proposals to be considered at statewide public hearings in January 2017, the Endowment Fund allocation, and Federal rules in university research.

Resolution Requiring Academic Institutions to Contribute Matching Funds on Federally-funded Cooperative Projects – On a motion by John Coley and second by Brian White, the Commission adopted a Resolution that rescinds its former resolution of No Overhead Payment to State-Supported Universities for Cooperative Projects adopted in 1995, and establishes a policy of requiring all academic institutions to provide the required non-federal funding match for all cooperative research. The Resolution is hereby incorporated by reference into the official record of this meeting.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT – USING ECONOMIC STUDIES TO SUPPORT AND PROMOTE FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE RESOURCES

Kerry Linehan, *Human Dimensions Biologist*, presented a spotlight about using economic data to support and promote fisheries and wildlife resources. The economic value to North Carolina is enhanced by business partners and policy managers who support the programs. Fishing, wildlife watching, and hunting have brought millions of dollars to the state.

In 2014, mountain trout fishing had an estimated total economic effect of \$383 million to North Carolina. The WRC partners with counties and towns to provide public access, improve infrastructure, and work on stream restoration for the wildlife resources.

Tundra swan hunting and watching enhance the economy of North Carolina overall, and in particular 16 counties in eastern North Carolina. More tundra swan winter in N. C. than anywhere and more are harvested in the state than anywhere else in North America.

In 2017, the impacts and value of game lands in North Carolina will be surveyed and an economic study of inland recreational fishing by species will be conducted.

INTERSTATE WILDLIFE VIOLATOR COMPACT RULEMAKING

On a motion by Tim Spear and second by Tom Berry, the Commission approved the staff recommendation for proposed Rules 15A NCAC 10A .1401, .1402, .1403, .1404, .1405, and .1406 to be presented at statewide public hearings in January 2017. The rule provisions are necessary to carry out the Interstate Wildlife Violator Compact. Exhibits D-1, D-2, D-3, D-4, D-5, D-6 are hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

FISCAL NOTE FOR INTERSTATE WILDLIFE VIOLATOR COMPACT RULES

Nat Harris made a motion to approve the fiscal note, presented in **Exhibit E** by Erica Garner, *Rulemaking Coordinator*, for proposed rules to carry out the Interstate Wildlife Violator Compact. The motion was seconded by Tim Spear and carried. **The Fiscal Note Review for Interstate Wildlife Violator Compact Rules** is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

<u>EDUCATION UPDATE</u> – Kris Smith, *Education Division Chief*, presented an update about the activities and programs of the Education Division. Smith reported that 168,000 attended the Mountain State Fair. Recent activities have included National Hunting and Fishing Day events at Lake Raleigh, the Pechmann Fishing Education Center, and Pisgah Center for Wildlife Education. The State Fair will be held in Raleigh later in October. The agency will highlight the Wildlife Action Plan. On October 14, 2016 there will be a ribbon cutting at the Holly Shelter Shooting Range.

INLAND FISHERIES

Fisheries Update - On behalf of Christian Waters, Todd Ewing reported that the agency has partnered with N.C. State University on a stocked trout program. The program will focus on learning how best to stock trout streams in the future.

Request from Town of Beech Mountain to Participate in the Mountain Heritage Trout Waters Program — On a motion by Wes Seegars and second by John Coley, the Commission voted to approve Exhibit F designating the Town of Beech Mountain as a Mountain Heritage Trout City, with recognition of the Public Mountain Trout Waters within Beech Mountain as Mountain Heritage Trout Waters. Exhibit F is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

Proposed Changes in 2017-2018 Fishing Rules for Presentation at Statewide Public Hearings – On a motion by John Coley and second by Tim Spear, the Commission approved staff recommendations for proposed changes in 2017-2018 fishing Rules to be presented at statewide public hearings in January 2017. Exhibit G-1 is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting:

Trout

- 1) Designate all undesignated waters on Stone Mountain State Park in Alleghany and Wilkes counties as Public Mountain Trout Waters and classify as Wild Trout Waters. Reclassify Harris Creek from Catch and Release Artificial Lures Only Trout Waters to Wild Trout Waters. The portions of Stone Mountain Creek and East Prong Roaring River currently classified as Delayed Harvest Trout Waters will remain unchanged. The proposed change will add approximately 30 miles of stream to Public Mountain Trout Waters.
 - 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 2) Designate all waters on Rendezvous Mountain State Forest Game Land in Wilkes County as Public Mountain Trout Waters and classify as Wild Trout Waters. The proposed change will add approximately 10 miles of stream to Public Mountain Trout Waters.
 - 15A NCAC 10D.0104 Fishing on Game Lands
- 3) Designate approximately 1.0 mile of Basin Creek in Wilkes County from S.R. 1730 bridge to the confluence with Lovelace Creek as Public Mountain Trout Waters and classify as Hatchery Supported Trout Waters.
 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 4) Modify the lower boundary of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters on Cove Creek in Watauga County adding approximately 1.8 miles of stream to Public Mountain Trout Waters. The designated reach will be from the S.R. 1233 bridge at Zionville to the S.R. 1214 bridge at Sherwood.
 - 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters

- 5) Modify the upper boundary of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters on Middle Fork New River in Watauga County removing approximately 1.0 mile of stream from Public Mountain Trout Waters. The designated reach will be from adjacent to the intersection of S.R. 1539 and U.S. 321 to the South Fork New River. 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 6) Modify the upper boundary of Catch and Release/Artificial Lures Only Trout Waters on Laurel Creek in Watauga County and exclude all tributaries removing approximately 9.5 miles of stream from Public Mountain Trout Waters. The designated reach will be from the confluence of North and South Fork Laurel creeks to Elk Creek, excluding tributaries. 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- Remove 7.4 miles of Dugger Creek in Watauga and Wilkes counties from Public Mountain Trout Waters.
 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 8) Amend the definition of Delayed Harvest Trout Waters to more clearly indicate that only lures having one single hook may be used.
 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters
- 9) Define youth as a person under 18 years of age. 15A NCAC 10C.0205 Public Mountain Trout Waters 15A NCAC 10C.0316 Trout

Black Bass

1) Modify the exception to the general statewide regulation for black bass in Lake Mattamuskeet and associated canals in Hyde County by increasing the minimum size limit of 14 inches to 16 inches and allowing only one fish greater than 20 inches to be possessed. The daily creel limit will remain 5 fish.

15A NCAC 10C.0305 Black Bass

Striped Bass and Bodie Bass (Hybrid Striped Bass)

 Modify the exception to the general statewide regulation for Striped Bass in inland fishing waters of the Neuse, Pungo and Tar-Pamlico rivers by increasing the minimum size limit of 18 inches to 26 inches. The daily creel limit (2 per day) and harvest season (October 1 – April 30) will not change.
 15A NCAC 10B .0314 Striped bass

Crappie

1) Modify the exception to the general statewide regulation for crappie in Lake Mattamuskeet and associated canals in Hyde County by increasing the minimum size limit of 8 inches to 10 inches. The daily creel limit will remain 20 fish.

White Bass

1) Modify the general statewide regulations for White Bass by establishing a minimum size limit of 14 inches and reducing the daily creel limit from 25 fish to 10 fish.

- Clarify that the taking of nongame fish for bait or personal consumption in inland waters using specific equipment only requires a license that authorizes basic fishing privileges.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

Wildlife Management Update – Dr. David Cobb, Wildlife Management Division Chief, presented an update about the activities of the Division of Wildlife Management. Cobb mentioned the gobbling chronology study and report that were presented to the Small Game and Wild Turkey Committee. Cobb announced that information from the Bear Forums will be available on the WRC website. The meetings of the Alligator Task Force will be held in Leland on November 1; Swansboro on November 2; and Manteo in Dare County on November 3, 2016.

Proposed Changes in 2017-2018 Wildlife Management Rules for Presentation at Statewide Public Hearings – Upon a motion by Nat Harris and second by Brian White, the Commission approved Exhibit H-1, staff recommendation for proposed changes in 2017-2018 hunting and trapping Rules to be presented at statewide public hearings in January 2017. Exhibit H-1 is hereby incorporated into the official record of this meeting:

Deer

 Create a third archery season segment in the Western deer season to open the Sunday immediately following the last day of gun season and close January 1 for antlered bucks only.

15A NCAC 10B .0203 Deer (White-Tailed)

Deer and Turkey

1) Define youth as a person under 18 years of age. 15A NCAC 10B.0203 Deer (White-Tailed) 15A NCAC 10B.0209 Wild turkey

Bear

- Extend the bear hunting season in Brunswick and Columbus counties. Under this
 proposal, Brunswick and Columbus counties would be moved into the bear hunting
 season that begins on the second Monday in November and extends to January 1.







Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): This tract is located in central Rockingham County, south of Eden. It has approximately 3.8 miles of frontage on the Dan River. Acquisition of this tract will help protect the federally-listed Roanoke Logperch, several State Listed species, and multiple Wildlife Action Plan species. This tract will offer angler

access to the Dan River, which contains a popular Largemouth Bass, Sunfish, and Channel Catfish fishery. Also, there is potential for canoe access area.

The vast majority of the uplands on this property have been converted in the last quarter century to extensive loblolly pine plantations, thus creating a large percentage of early successional habitat. The bottomlands and slopes, have also been clear-cut or severely high-graded in the last half century. Except for riparian buffer areas, there is very little mature or high quality forest remaining. (Riparian buffers on this tract total almost 530 acres.) However, the slopes have recovered somewhat and the bottomland second growth has returned to pole stage/pulpwood size.

There are approximately 72 acres of fields currently in agricultural production or at least being maintained as open, with considerable acreage, especially in the bottomlands that has been abandoned and has returned to typical floodplain forest species. One unique opportunity exists to create a managed waterfowl impoundment along the southwestern corner of the property between the slopes and the river. Site specifics and soil characteristics were not determined, but from topographical examination, an impoundment of 130-140 acres could possibly be built. There are a few old small "farm" ponds in various states of function, but these only total ~2.5 acres. Natural wetlands (semi-permanent impoundments) at the northern end of the property total ~12-15 acres in wet times.

This tract would provide excellent hunting opportunities for both big game and small game species. Deer and turkey hunting would likely need to be administered through the Permit Hunt Opportunities Program. Small game and migratory bird hunting should be monitored by Point-of-Sale Permitting. This tract has great potential for public dove field development, appears premier for rabbit hunting, offers good opportunity for squirrel and raccoon, likely still retains some Bobwhite Quail, and certainly holds good numbers of wintering woodcock and waterfowl during specific times of the year.

Prescribed burning opportunities are considerable on this tract. An extensive network of very well-maintained roads and trails, good access points, the presence of a major transmission powerline ROW, and the proximity to the river would allow very safe burning conditions and a minimal amount of significant fire line construction to eventually maintain the pine uplands.

Additional Comments: The tract offers ample public access via Riverside Road (SR 2108), Woodpecker Road (SR 2110), Buttercup Road (SR 2107), and NC Hwy 770.

Preliminary estimates of five-year stewardship expenditures include marking/maintaining \sim 14.5 miles of property boundary (\$2,900), installing 5 gates (\$5,000) and developing 1 small parking area (\$1000) for a total estimated cost of \$8,900.

No short-term revenue is projected from the tract. However, future timber management in extensive loblolly pine plantations will generate significant revenue, with first-thinnings, second-thinnings, and eventual final harvests. Currently, many of the loblolly pine stands are in need of first-thinning, as none are older than about 20 years of age.





Galloway Tract Rockingham County 1,768 Acres







Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): Property contains both upland pine and bottomland hardwood. Over-story consists of older age longleaf, loblolly, and pond pine. Scattered mid-story consists of wax myrtle, bay species, red maple, and water oak. Ground cover includes gall berry, blue berry, and wiregrass. Prescribed fire has been applied to this tract of land on a regular basis. An existing road system provides access throughout the tract. This tract shares more than 4 miles of common boundary with the adjacent Bear Garden tract of Holly Shelter Game Land.

Based upon data found in the NC Conservation Planning Tool, the Godwin Tract's Biodiversity index has an estimated relative conservation value of 6.5 (1- low-10 high values). All of this tract had a score of 6 or 7.

Acquisition would improve management capabilities and provide additional habitat for numerous species. White-tailed deer, wild turkey, black bear, quail, and other small game species occur on the Godwin Tract. Nongame, threatened and endangered species potentially occurring on this tract are listed in the attached tabular summary of priority species.

Additional Comments: This tract could provide exceptional outdoor recreational opportunities for multiple traditional and non-traditional user groups. Disabled sportsmen could benefit from the addition of a permitted, or non-permitted, shooting house style blind. Also, there is potential to develop and equestrian parking facility to accommodate horse trailers and tow-vehicles.








Godwin Bear Garden Tract Holly Shelter Game Land Pender County 1,367 Acres

Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): The Godwin II tract is a 44-acre property partially composed of the Jordan Creek Floodplain Natural Heritage Natural Area (value 'High') where there is a Streamhead Atlantic White Cedar Forest, which is a rare natural community tracked by the NC Natural Heritage Program. This rare community is dominated (50-65%) by Atlantic white cedar (*Chamaecyparis thyoides*). Other canopy trees noted are pond pine (*Pinus serotina*) and some loblolly pine (*P. taeda*). Atlantic white cedar is used by many species of greatest conservation need, including: green herons, northern bobwhite, hairy

woodpecker, etc. The property borders approximately 2,500 feet of Jordan Creek. The non-floodplain portion of the tract has intact wiregrass and approximately 10-year longleaf pines (*P. palustris*), as well as some mixed oak and is in need of prescribed fire. The tract shares approximately 2,000 feet of common boundary with Block B of Sandhills Game Land, via the recently acquired Gibson tract, and helps build landscape connectivity that will enhance wildlife corridors, public access, and facilitate prescribed burning.

Additional Comments: Access to the tract is provided via adjoining Sandhills Game Land and a two-track sand road along the western edge of the tract.







Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): The larger Herrin tract, representing approximately 140 acres, borders Pond Mountain Game Land at its southeastern end and would extend State ownership to Whenlin Ridge Road (S.R. 1359), providing approximately 0.4 mi. of road frontage. An additional public parking area as well as a designated camping area could be provided in this location.

Tract elevation ranges from approximately 3,200 - 4,000 ft. Appalachian oak and Appalachian cove forests are the most prevalent habitat types on the tract, with a small amount of open and old field habitat. The tract also contains approximately 1,700 feet of Little Horse Creek, and another 3,000 feet of unnamed tributary. These habitats will provide excellent opportunities to

manage for the following species of greatest conservation need: Northern pigmy salamander, Weller's salamander, Southern ravine salamander, Yonahlossee salamander, Veery, Eastern milksnake, Eastern box turtle, Appalachian cottontail, and ruffed grouse. A portion of the riparian area on the tract lies within an old pasture. Some of this area may be suitable for bog restoration and could potentially provide habitat for bog turtle. The tracts also contain many popular game animals such as white-tailed deer, black bear, wild turkey, cottontail rabbit, ruffed grouse, and raccoon.

The property has high value for hunting and other dispersed recreational activities, forestry, and scientific and educational purposes. The location and current condition of this tract combine to create an ideal property for inclusion in the Game Lands Program.

The smaller 34-acre Herrin tract is located just south of the larger tract and contains approximately 500 feet of frontage on Tucker Road (S.R. 1356). Habitats are similar to the larger tract, with Appalachian oak and Appalachian cove forests most prevalent. Elevation ranges from 3,400 to 3,600 feet. Approximately 1,400 feet of unnamed tributary to Little Horse Creek passed through the tract. Of primary importance is the presence of significant wetlands and bog habitat within the cleared portion of the property historically used for pasture and/or hay production. If acquired and protected, the potential for this tract to provide critical habitat for the federally threatened bog turtle is high.





Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): The Range 17 tract is bordered on the east by private ownership, the south by private ownership and Camden County property, the west by US 17 and Dismal Swamp State Park and private ownership to the north. The property consists of young loblolly pine plantation (6-10 years), which composes the majority of the property and a 28-acre agricultural field and mixed pine hardwood stands on wet sites. Historically, the site supported extensive stands of Atlantic White Cedar and could potentially be considered for restoration after the final harvest of the planted loblolly pine. The majority of the soils on the property are classed as mucks (Belhaven, Roper and Wasda), with a small area along the northeast boundary identified as Portsmouth Fine Sand. Three major drainage ditches either border or are contained within the tract and assist in draining the property. It appears that most of the drainage from the tract flows west towards the Great Dismal Swamp. Approximately, 282 acres of the property in the central southern portion of the tract lies within a designated flood zone. Access on the property is good and provided by 9.5 miles of well-maintained dirt based roads.

Based upon data found in the NC Conservation Planning Tool, the property has a very high Biodiversity Relative Conservation Value. 1,846 acres (99% of property acreage) supports a BWHA index score of 9-10, the highest value of this index. The remaining 1% of the property can be split between a score of 6 and 0 unrated (0- low-10 high values). The Biodiversity/Wildlife Habitat Index prioritizes aquatic and terrestrial habitat, landscape function and connectivity.

The property supports a well-established bear population and contains some very large bears based on discussion with the local bear hunting club that leases the property. High deer activity was seen along the property border where it lies adjacent to agricultural areas. Currently, the tract supports early successional habitat that should provide valuable food and cover for small game species such as rabbits. Feral hogs have been seen on adjacent tracts and are likely present on the subject property as well.

The Range 17 site is part of the Green Sea Significant Natural Heritage Area. This ecological community is rated as a R2, which indicates very high ecological importance.

Additional Comments: The Range 17 tract could provide additional game land opportunities in a part of North Carolina where accessible game lands are lacking. However, to maintain a quality hunting experience, it is recommended that this tract, if acquired, be incorporated into the Permit Hunt Opportunity Program to limit hunting pressure.

In addition, the Camden County Board of Commissioners has expressed interest and support in the attraction of a facility that would provide public game lands and a public shooting range. This tract could provide the land base and resources to potentially meet the game lands requirement.


Whereas, a public outdoor fire arms facility and public hunting lands are not anticipated to have a negative impact on area wildlife;


Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): The Usher Tract is bisected by US Hwy 15-501 and is comprised of two different aged longleaf pine stands. On the east, the pines are approximately 10 years old. On the west, the longleaf are 30-40 years old. Both stands contain intact wiregrass understory, and both are in need of fire. A small portion of the eastern stand burned in a wildfire in 2015 and shows a dramatic positive understory species and vigor response. The combined tracts complete a habitat corridor connecting the Aberdeen Road Sandhills Natural Area to the Watery Branch Sandhills Natural area. Conservation of the Usher tract will provide habitat for a number of WAP species including Bachman's Sparrow, Brown Headed Nuthatch, and Red-cockaded Woodpecker. 



Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): This Waccamaw River tract is approximately 3000 ac. of hardwood and cypress sloughs, mixed between middle-aged loblolly pine stands. Much of the sloughs are already registered as Natural Areas with the Natural Heritage Program (236-acres Waccamaw River Cross Swamp Bottomlands). A nice scattering of Atlantic white cedar is also present, and this habitat has good restoration potential. A good system of interior roads is already present, although these roads will need repair or upgrading for game land users. The tract is directly across the Waccamaw River from the Columbus County Game Land.

The NC Coastal Land Trust has already purchased one tract from the Campbell Group closer to Lake Waccamaw, (and is in the process of developing a Purchase and Sales Agreement for another contiguous tract), next to Waccamaw State Park, making a significant corridor of conservation lands in this area.

The tract supports NCWRC Wildlife Action Plan Priority habitats and species and will provide valuable habitat for reptiles, amphibians, birds and mammals. Examples of species that this property will be especially beneficial for are black bear, white-tailed deer, wild turkey, Swainson's warbler, Prothonotary warbler, wood stork, swallow-tailed kite, Rafinesque's bigeared bat, Eastern spadefoot and Eastern mudsnake.

Based upon data found in the NC Conservation Planning Tool, the Waccamaw Campbell Global Phase IV Tract's Biodiversity index score is 6 out of 10 (1- low-10 high values). The Biodiversity/Wildlife Habitat Index prioritizes aquatic and terrestrial habitat, landscape function, and connectivity.







Resources Assessment and Biological Benefits (brief): Acquisition of this property is significant as part of the total management project being carried out in the mountain Eco region. WRC ownership of the tract will increase conservation ownership of properties in the immediate area such as the Nantahala National Forest and properties owned by Mainspring Conservation Trust, formerly the Land Trust for the Little Tennessee (LTLT). In a broader sense, WRC ownership of the tract will help ensure ecosystem integrity at the landscape level by increasing connectivity of lands in conservation ownership such as Nantahala National Forest, Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Needmore Game Land (WRC holdings), Mainspring lands and various private holdings that are in conservation ownership or have conservation easements that are located in the vicinity. WRC ownership will help reduce land fragmentation as well.

Management objectives will include restoring or maintaining the oak forest and cove forest priority wildlife habitats that are located on the tract. WRC ownership would ensure these habitats are protected and managed for wildlife conservation and public use in perpetuity. WRC ownership may also provide opportunities to create some early successional habitat (ESH),

which is a priority wildlife habitat. Resent logging activity on the tract will assist in the ESH creation and enhancement.

Public recreational opportunities will include hunting, fishing, hiking, bird watching, photography, and general nature study. Educational opportunities may exist as priority wildlife habitats are managed for or maintained. The majority of the tract is forested with Appalachian oak and Appalachian cove forests predominant. Common wildlife species found on the tract include wild turkey, black bear, white-tailed deer, gray squirrel, ruffed grouse as well as various songbirds, salamanders, and small mammals. The tract is adjacent to existing Needmore Game Land.

Additional Comments: WRC ownership of this tract will also improve public access to existing WRC game lands. Access to Needmore Game Land from Highway 28 is limited. Highway 28 runs through this tract. In addition to the highway running through the property, logging activity that has taken place on the property resulted in a creation of a nice, flat logging deck just below the highway. This deck will provide an excellent opportunity to create a public parking area to enhance access to existing game land. Skid trails leading from the deck into the game land will also enhance access.





Cunningham Tract Needmore GL Swain County 38 Acres











Melton Tract South Mountains GL McDowell & Burke Counties 93 Acres







The proposed amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0355 (APPENDIX 1) will establish a no-wake zone in a portion of Yeopim Creek at Heritage Shores Subdivision in Perquimans County.

Perquimans County submitted a formal application to establish a no-wake zone in a portion of the waters of Yeopim Creek. This part of Yeopim Creek is narrow, with multiple private docks and two blind corners. One fatal boat accident occurred here recently. Wildlife Enforcement has concurred that placement of four buoys, two to mark both ends of the no-wake zone and one each at the two blind corners within the no-wake zone, will mitigate hazards to boater safety.

Perquimans County will purchase four buoys and will mark the no-wake zone at a cost of no more than \$3200.00. Of that cost, the County may spend \$400.00 for the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permit required under § 113A-118 before placing structures in waters in coastal counties. Four buoys, anchor chains and anchors will cost no more than \$2400.00. Estimated cost for two staff members to place the buoys is sixteen hours (2 employees x 8 hours), for a total of \$400.00.

State Impact Analysis: None.

Local Impact Analysis: Perquimans County will incur an expense of no more than \$3,200.00 to purchase and place four buoys to mark the no-wake zone.

Private Impact: This rule has minimal private fiscal impact. The regulated community will not incur any direct financial cost as a result of this rule change, but their behavior will be restricted in a portion of Yeopim Creek. However, the benefit of that restriction is increased boater safety.

Substantial Economic Impact

None. There will be no substantial economic impact to the public.

 - (2) Yeopim River:
 - (A) The canal entrance between Navaho Trail and Cherokee Trail;
 - (B) The canal entrance between Cherokee Trail and Ashe Street;
 - (C) The boat ramp at Ashe and Pine Street;
 - (D) The canal entrance between Pine Street and Linden Street;
 - (E) The canal entrance and boat ramp between Willow Street and Evergreen Drive;
 - (F) The canal entrance between Sago Street and Alder Street;
 - (G) The swimming area at the Snug Harbor Park and Beach; and
 - (H) Bethel Creek north of a line from a point on the west shore at 36.09552N, 76.47958W to a point on the east shore at 36.095517N, 76.47735W to a line from a point on the west shore at 36.10532N, 76.48080W to a point on the east shore at 36.10516N, 76.48047W.
 - (3) Yeopim Creek:
 - (A) The canal entrance between Mohave Trail and Iowa Trail;
 - (B) The canal entrance between Iowa Trail and Shawnee Trail;
 - (C) The area within 75 yards of the Albemarle Plantation Marina Piers; and
 - (D) The area of Beaver Cove as delineated by appropriate markers: markers; and
 - (E) The waters of Yeopim Creek adjacent to Heritage Shores North, shore to shore, east of a line from a point on the north shore at 36.11356 N, 76.43138 W to a point on the south shore at 36.11288 N, 76.43173 W, and northwest of a line from a point on the east shore at 36.11219 N, 76.42445 W to a point on the west shore at 36.11178 N, 76.42596 W.
 - (4) Little River: The entrance to the cove known as "Muddy Gut Canal," which extends from the waters known as "Deep Creek."
- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate any motorboat or vessel at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated area described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Board of Commissioners of Perquimans County is designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of markers implementing this Rule.

PROPOSED PERMANENT RULEMAKING AMENDMENT TO 15A NCAC 10F .0355 – YEOPIM CREEK PERQUIMANS COUNTY

The Wildlife Resources Commission has received a formal application from the Perquimans County Board of Commissioners requesting a no wake zone within the waters of Yeopim Creek adjacent to Heritage Shores North Subdivision.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and recommends a no wake zone in a portion of Yeopim Creek shore to shore, to mitigate hazards to boater safety. Part of the creek is narrow with two sharp corners that restrict the ability of boaters to see oncoming traffic. A fatal boating accident occurred recently in this part of the creek.

The Perquimans County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing on October 3, 2016 and submitted a Resolution (attached) requesting that the WRC undertake rulemaking to create a no wake zone in Yeopim Creek. Perquimans County agrees to be responsible for purchase, placement and maintenance of buoys to mark the zone.

Staff recommends that the Commission approve publishing *Notice of Text* in the *NC Register* for adoption of an amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0355(a)(3)(E), with an open comment period of at least 60 days and one local public hearing per the Administrative Procedure Act. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will then consider adoption of the no wake zone.

15A NCAC 10F .0355 PERQUIMANS COUNTY

- (a) Regulated Areas. This Rule applies to the following waters:
 - (1) Perguimans River:

WHEREAS the safety for property owners adjacent to the current no-wake zone has come into question by those citizens and other concerned with wakes created by boats and personal watercraft operating at high speeds, and

WHEREAS the narrow portion of the Yeopim Creek that flows through the area referenced in this resolution makes it dangerous for canoers and kayakers who use the creek in this area, and swimmers, to be in such close contact with power boaters operating their vessels at higher than necessary speeds, and

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of Perquimans County has received a signed petition by the residents along the Bethel Creek requesting to establish a no-wake zone, and

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of Perquimans County wishes to establish the No-Wake zone per the attached map or as described as follows:

To establish a No-Wake Zone for the part of the body of water known at Yeopim Creek located off Yeopim River (adjacent to Heritage Shores North) in Bethel Township starting at N 36° 6.796' W 76° 25.892' (near the mouth of the Yeopim River) to N 36° 6.718' W 76° 25.892'.

BE IT RESOLVED that in accordance with G.S. 75A-15, the Board of Commissioners of Perquimans County requests the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission to promulgate special rules and regulations with reference to safe and reasonable operation of vessels on the waters of the areas listed above and noted on the attached map located in said County, the pertinent substance of which proposed regulations is as follows: a No-Wake Zone for the part of the body of water known as Yeopim Creek located off Yeopim River (adjacent to Heritage Shores North) in Bethel Township starting at N 36° 6.796'W 76° 25.892' (near the mouth of the Yeopim River [adjacent to Heritage Shores North]) to N 36° 6.718' W 76° 25.892' as shown on the attached map which falls within the limits and regulations of the N.C. Wildlife Commission.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the said Board of Commissioners request that said Commission to promulgate regulations fully implementing the Uniform Waterway Marker System in all of the waters of the said County.

The proposed permanent amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0308 would extend an existing no-wake zone to include the waters of all of Shooting Creek, a tributary of Lake Chatuge in Clay County.

Clay County submitted a formal application to extend a no-wake zone in Shooting Creek, from its current location in the vicinity of the High Bridge to the southeast end of Shooting Creek shore to shore. Numerous significant hazards to boater safety have been identified in Shooting Creek, including the congested narrow channel, underwater rocky hazards, limited visibility, and danger to swimmers.

Clay County will mark the no-wake zone at a cost of no more than \$1000. One buoy, anchor chain and anchor will cost no more than \$600.00. Estimated cost for two County staff members to place the buoy is four hours, for a total of \$400.00.

State Impact Analysis: None

Local Impact Analysis: Clay County will incur an expense of no more than \$1000.00 to purchase and place one buoy to mark the no-wake zone.

Private Impact: The rule has minimal private fiscal impact. The regulated community will not incur any direct financial cost as a result of this rule change, but their behavior will be restricted in the waters of Shooting Creek. However, the benefit of that restriction is increased boater safety. **Substantial Economic Impact:** There will be no substantial economic impact to the public.

PROPOSED PERMANENT RULEMAKING AMENDMENT TO 15A NCAC 10F .0308 – LAKE CHATUGE CLAY COUNTY

The Wildlife Resources Commission has received a formal application from the Clay County Board of Commissioners requesting extension of a no-wake zone in Shooting Creek on Lake Chatuge, from its current location in the vicinity of the High Bridge to extend to the southeast end of Shooting Creek.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and recommends extending the no-wake zone to include all of Shooting Creek shore to shore to mitigate hazards to boater safety. The creek is a narrow congested channel with underwater rock hazards. There is limited visibility as boaters travel around the point at the High Bridge. Wakes from boats pose a hazard to adults and children who swim and use multiple docks along the creek.

The Clay County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing on October 6, 2016 and submitted a Resolution (attached) requesting that the WRC undertake rulemaking to extend the no-wake zone in Shooting Creek. Clay County agrees to be responsible for purchase, placement and maintenance of one buoy to mark the zone.

Staff recommends that the Commission approve publishing *Notice of Text* in the *NC Register* for adoption of an amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0308, with an open comment period of at least 60 days and one local public hearing per the Administrative Procedure Act. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will then consider adoption of an extension of the no wake zone.

RESOLUTION OF CLAY COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS REQUESTING THAT THE NORTH CAROLINA WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION UNDERTAKE RULEMAKING FOR THE PURPOSE OF ESTABLISHING A NEW "NO WAKE ZONE" IN THE HIGH BRIDGE AND SHOOTING CREEK AREAS OF LAKE CHATUGE FOR THE PURPOSE OF MITIGATING HAZARDS TO WATER SAFETY

THAT WHEREAS, there is presently existing a "no wake zone" located in the High Bridge Area of Lake Chatuge located in Clay County, North Carolina, as established by Local Rule for Clay County in 15A NCAC 10F.0308 (c)(1); and

WHEREAS, since the establishment of such "no wake zone", referenced above, Clay County is now of the opinion that the presently existing "no wake zone" referenced hereinabove does not provide a sufficiently large "no wake zone" so as to afford sufficient protection of boaters and swimmers who will be jointly using the High Bridge and Shooting Creek areas of Lake Chatuge for boating and swimming and that a larger "no wake zone" in the High Bridge and Shooting Creek Areas of Lake Chatuge is needed for the purpose of mitigating hazards to water safety in that area of Lake Chatuge based upon the following reasons:

- A. The waters of Lake Chatuge in the area of High Bridge and Shooting Creek in Clay County, North Carolina, are narrow and curvy and as a consequence, views can be obstructed which cause safety issues when boats are traveling at greater speeds;

PROPOSED PERMANENT RULEMAKING AMENDMENT TO 15A NCAC 10F .0323 – BURKE COUNTY

The Wildlife Resources Commission has received a formal application from the Burke County Board of Commissioners requesting a no-wake zone on Lake James in the waters of Sherman's Hollow Cove shore to shore, and contiguous with the waters within 50 yards of Linville Point.

Agency Enforcement has investigated the area and recommends the no-wake zone to mitigate hazards to boater safety. Sherman's Hollow Cove is narrow with obstructed views, and heavy boat traffic poses dangers to swimmers and kayakers along Linville Point.

The Burke County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing on September 16, 2016 and submitted a Resolution (attached) requesting that the WRC undertake rulemaking for a no-wake zone in Sherman's Hollow Cove and within 50 yards of the shoreline of Linville Point. Private property owners agree to be responsible for purchase, placement and maintenance of buoys to mark the zone, at no expense to county or state government. No fiscal note is required.

Staff recommends that the Commission approve publishing *Notice of Text* in the *NC Register* for adoption of an amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0323(a)(2)(J), with an open comment period of at least 60 days and one local public hearing per the Administrative Procedure Act. Upon the close of the open comment period, the WRC will then consider adoption of an extension of the no wake zone.

 - (G) Highway 126 Bridge, area defined using the North American Datum of 1983 beginning 50 yards from the northeast side defined by a shore to shore line extending from state plane coordinates: Northing = 224985.481182, Easting = 348767.698377 to Northing = 224912.319514, Easting = 348805.193732, encompassing all waters to a line 200 yards south of the bridge defined by a line extending shore to shore from state plane coordinates: Northing = 224723.881492, Easting = 348679.284125 to Northing = 224835.222394, Easting = 348534.751513; That portion of Lake James shore to shore, beginning 50 yards northeast of the NC Highway 126 Bridge at a line from a point on the north shore at 35.74398 N, 81.88426 W, to a point on the south shore at 35.74334 N, 81.88383 W, and ending at a line 215 yards southwest of the NC Highway 126 Bridge, from a point on the northwest shore at 35.74257 N, 81.88679 W to a point on the southeast shore at 35.74160 N, 81.88516 W;
 - (H) Canal Bridge Boating Access Area: within Within 50 yards of the Canal Bridge Boating Access Area dock;
 - (I) South Pointe/Dry Creek Community Piers in the vicinity of the point of land at Lot 86 at the South Pointe Subdivision. Area defined using the North American Datum of 1983 and encompassing waters off the point; from the shoreline, 50 yards out to a perimeter defined by the following State Plane Coordinates: Northing = 226977.08583, Easting = 353148.128305; Northing = 226950.431724, Easting = 353076.195527; Northing = 227004.286569, Easting = 353011.808157; and Northing = 227082.795442, Easting = 353042.59595. The waters within 50 yards of the end of the South Pointe Subdivision peninsula from a point east of the peninsula at 35.76307 N, 81.83768 W, and surrounding the peninsula to a point west of the peninsula at 35.76307 N, 81.83648 W;
 - (J) The waters of Sherman's Hollow Cove shore to shore, and contiguous with those waters beginning at a point on the west shore of the mouth of Sherman's Hollow Cove at 35.76423 N, 81.82748 W, extending northeast within 50 yards of Linville Point to a point on the northeast shore of Linville Point at 35.76596 N, 81.82432 W.

- (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed within 50 yards of any designated public boat launching ramp, bridge, marina, boat storage structure, boat service area, dock, or pier; or while on designated waters of the areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Speed Limit in Mooring Areas. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed while within a marked mooring area established with the approval of the Executive Director, or his representative, on the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (d) Restricted Swimming Areas. No person operating or responsible for the operation of a vessel shall permit it to enter any marked public swimming area established with the approval of the Executive Director, or his representative, on the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (e) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Board of Commissioners of Burke County is designated a suitable agency for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, if applicable. With regard to marking the regulated areas described in Paragraph (a) of this Rule, all of the supplementary standards listed in Rule .0301(g) of this Section shall apply.

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

The proposed amendment to 15A NCAC 10F .0321 (APPENDIX 1) will establish a no-wake zone in the waters of Deep Creek off of Topsail Sound, along the waterfront in the Town of Surf City, Pender County.

The Town of Surf City submitted a formal application to establish a no-wake zone in the waters of the channel known as Deep Creek along the town waterfront. The creek is narrow with a high amount of traffic, and includes fueling docks, a commercial fish house, and a public vessel access area for commercial and residential boaters. Wildlife Enforcement has concurred that placement of three no-wake markers on two pilings inside the creek will mitigate hazards to boater safety. The piling at the entrance to the no-wake zone will have signs on both sides to mark the entrance and exit of the no-wake zone.

The Town of Surf City will purchase markers and pilings and will mark the no-wake zone at a cost of no more than \$2300.00. Of that cost, the Town may spend \$400.00 for the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) permit required under § 113A-118 before placing structures in waters in coastal counties. Two pilings and three no-wake signs will cost no more than \$700.00. Estimated labor cost for three marine technicians to sink two pilings and place three markers on pilings is 48 hours (16 hours each), for a total of \$1200.00.

State Impact Analysis: None.

Local Impact Analysis: The Town of Surf City will incur an expense of no more than \$2,300.00 to purchase and place two pilings and three markers to mark the no-wake zone.

Private Impact: This rule has minimal private fiscal impact. The regulated community will not incur any direct financial cost as a result of this rule change, but their behavior will be restricted in Deep Creek along the town waterfront. However, the benefit of that restriction is increased boater safety.

Substantial Economic Impact

None. There will be no substantial economic impact to the public.



The Outdoor Heritage Trust Fund

for

Youth Outdoor Heritage Promotion

Background

The Outdoor Heritage Trust Fund for Youth Outdoor Heritage Promotion (OHTF) was established by the North Carolina General Assembly in 2015 under North Carolina Session Law 2015-144. In accordance with Session Law 2015-144, this plan for establishing and implementing the OHTF was jointly developed by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission (Commission) and the N.C. Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council (COUNCIL).

The Trust Fund plan:

- (1) Provides for the expansion of opportunities for persons age 16 and under to engage in outdoor recreational activities, including, but not limited to, hiking, horseback riding, boating, sport shooting and archery, bird watching and wildlife watching, camping, swimming, hunting, trapping, and fishing in order to pass on North Carolina's outdoor heritage to future generations.
- (2) Includes eligibility for the receipt of funds through check-off donations by persons paying for transactions processed through the Commission, including, but not limited to, hunting and fishing licenses or paying outdoor access fees issued by other organizations and also through donations from private organizations or citizens.
- (3) Shall be administered by the COUNCIL.

Goals

Consistent with legislation, the overall goal for expenditures from the OHTF is to measurably expand opportunities for youth to participate in outdoor recreational activities. This plan provides the basis upon which to categorize, solicit, evaluate, and select proposals for OHTF support.

OHTF Funding Eligibility

OHTF funds may be expended by the COUNCIL to meet objectives of its Strategic Plan.

Also, this plan establishes two primary program areas under which funding requests will be categorized:

Infrastructure: Activities directly related to enhancing existing facilities and acquisition

of properties that directly enhance outdoor recreational opportunities for

youth.

Programs: Organized activities directly related to expanding outdoor recreational

opportunities for youth.

Infrastructure

Objective: Provide improved or increased facilities and locations for youth to participate in outdoor recreational activities.

Increasing youth participation in outdoor recreational activities cannot be increased without providing safe and conveniently located infrastructure that provide youth specific opportunities. Additional or enhanced access sites, including but not limited to, fishing piers, riding trails, hiking trails, game lands, camping sites, target ranges, and swimming areas should be constructed or acquired to support and provide access for youth to participate in outdoor recreational activities.

Strategy I.1 – Construction or enhancement of existing facilities that enhance the ability of youth to participate in outdoor recreational activities.

Strategy I.2 – Acquisition of real property for the purposes of providing youth opportunities to participate in outdoor recreational activities.

Programs

Objective: Provide products, programs, or other support that increases youth participation in outdoor recreational activities.

Barriers to increased participation are variable but include geographically limited distribution of programs and services. Also, many outdoor recreational activities are heritage activities that historically have been passed on from one generation to the next. Due to multiple factors, including increasing urbanization, work demands, and family structure, the traditional knowledge about how to participate in these activities may be lost. It is imperative to provide programming and outreach to youth to that includes fundamentals and skills necessary to successfully participate in these activities and enjoy the benefits of participation.

- Strategy P.1 Develop and conduct workshops, clinics, and programming that provides skills based training for youth.
- Strategy P.2 Develop and provide outreach materials that provide instructions on how to participate in outdoor recreational activities and where youth may go to participate.
- Strategy P.3 Provide support for youth to participate in workshops, clinics, and camps that provide training and experiences in outdoor recreational activities.

Recipient Eligibility Requirements for Funding

To be eligible for funding from the OHTF, organizations must directly serve youth within North Carolina. Eligible organizations must provide equal opportunity in its employment, programs, and services.

Role of the COUNCIL

The COUNCIL is responsible for stewardship of the OHTF. The COUNCIL will develop standards for fund management and funding delivery methods that assure fiscal accountability and allocation of funds in accordance with the purposes set forth in this plan.

- 1. Establish OHTF funding cycles.
- 2. Determine percentage or maximum amount of funds that may be distributed from the OHTF for each funding cycle.
- 3. Determine submission guidelines for Requests For Proposals (RFP).
- 4. Publish public notices for RFPs.
- 5. Receive and review RFPs, including evaluation of proposal eligibility and alignment with strategies.
- 6. Select proposals to receive OHTF funding.
- 7. Notify applicants of funded and non-funded projects.
- 8. Authorize disbursement of funds from the OHTF to meet the COUNCIL Strategic Plan and/or one or more of the strategies identified in the Program Areas listed above.
- 9. Review project reports and status of funded projects annually.
- 10. Prepare and publish an annual report detailing the purposes of all allocated funding through the OHTF, the results of funding, and the total costs.

Administrative Procedures for Funding

This section outlines procedures to solicit Request for Proposals (RFP) and review, approval, accounting, and reporting for projects.

1. Funding Cycle

RFP will be issued as directed by the COUNCIL. Project proposals from eligible entities shall be accepted for two months from issuance of the RFP. The RFP shall include the Program Areas and strategies identified, proposal submission guidelines, and the submission deadline.

The COUNCIL Chair or designee will be responsible for sending out the RFP during each funding cycle. The RFP will be listed on the COUNCIL website. At the time the RFP is initially circulated, a news release will be issued notifying them of the OHTF RFP and providing instructions to contact the COUNCIL Liaison for more information.

The COUNCIL Liaison will receive requests for information and answer all questions about the technical aspects of the RFP, OHTF, and COUNCIL.

Proposals shall be sent by applicants to the attention of the COUNCIL Liaison. All proposals must be received by the COUNCIL Liaison no later than 5:00 pm on the closing date specified in the RFP document. No late proposals will be accepted. If proposals are received after the published deadline, the applicant will be notified that their proposal will not be considered for funding in this cycle and that they may reapply during the next cycle.

The COUNCIL Liaison shall be responsible for logging each proposal and verifying that the applicant meets the Recipient Eligibility Requirements for Funding. If an applicant does not meet eligibility requirements, the COUNCIL Liaison shall notify the applicant immediately. The COUNCIL Liaison shall assign each proposal from an eligible applicant an identification number for tracking purposes, and screen each proposal for completeness. If a proposal is incomplete, the COUNCIL shall contact the applicant to provide the necessary information within ten business days.

2. Review of Proposals

The COUNCIL Liaison shall submit a summary of proposals and the full proposals to the OHTF Review Committee. Each proposal shall be reviewed by at least three committee members. The committee members shall instruct the COUNCIL Liaison to notify applicants of suggested edits or clarifications needed from the review process. Responses shall be made to the COUNCIL Liaison within five business days. If the applicant chooses to revise their submittal, they shall notify the COUNCIL Liaison within five business days and supply the revised application within ten business days of the initial contact.

After reviewing all of the proposals, the OHTF Review Committee shall meet to review and rank all qualified proposals. The OHTF Review Committee may recommend full funding, partial funding or no funding for each proposal. The OHTF Review Committee shall present their recommendation to the full COUNCIL at the next scheduled business meeting for approval. The COUNCIL Liaison shall maintain a list of all proposals, the rankings of those proposals, recommendation of the committee, and justification for recommendation and provide a briefing book for each COUNCIL member prior to the business meeting where final approval on proposals will be discussed. It is expected that this process will be completed within 90 calendar days after the deadline for proposals.

3. Notification of Applicants

A letter detailing the funding recommendations of the COUNCIL will be sent to each applicant from the COUNCIL Chair. Letters for successful applicants shall include requirements to be completed prior to beginning work. Letters for unsuccessful applicants shall include the reasons why the proposal was not selected. After the letters have been sent, a news release will be issued announcing the proposals selected for funding.

4. Establish Contracts

All funded projects, except for funds made available to provide support to the COUNCIL to meet the objectives of its Strategic Plan, shall have a contract established. A contract template will be developed and approved by the COUNCIL prior to the initiation of the first contract cycle.

5. Project Monitoring and Reporting

Grants awarded to applicants will be administered by the Commission. The COUNCIL Liaison will serve as the liaison between the grantee and the appropriate Commission staff.

For single year grants, a final report shall be due 90 days after the end of the grant term or end of the project. For multi-year grants, interim reports are due 90 days after the end of each 12-month period from the start date of the grant and a final report shall be due 90 days after the end of the grant term or end of the project.

Interim reports shall include at a minimum:

- Title Page grant name, time period covered, applicant's name, and date of submission
- Objective(s) of grant
- Activity during reporting period
- Target Dates for Accomplishments including measurements of success

- Significant Deviations from proposed project timeline
- Activities for Next Reporting Period
- Total Costs

Final reports shall include at a minimum:

- Title Page grant name, time period covered, applicant's name, and date of submission
- Abstract/Executive Summary
- Objective(s) of grant
- Activities performed
- Measurements of Success
- Significant Deviations
- Recommendations/Summary
- Total Costs

The COUNCIL Liaison shall be responsible for maintaining copies of all grant documentation and reports and ensuring that these records are available for all who request them.

Procedures for revising the OHTF Plan

This plan is intended to be a living document and the COUNCIL may modify the plan to adapt to changing conditions in North Carolina to more effectively achieve the goals set forth herein.
