Timely Tip - The Importance of Body Language

Standing in front of a group of any size makes you the center of attention. But words only carry part of your message. Consider how you stand, the way you gesture, how you make eye contact and even the expressions on your face, and how it all affects the audience.

Body language can go long way toward delivering an effective message or distracting listeners. Here are some tips:

- Stand (or sit) up straight, and remember to breathe.
- Hold your head up and maintain good eye contact.
- Smile when you say “welcome” and whenever else appropriate.
- Don’t fold your arms, clench your fists or make wild gestures.

You may not be aware of what you are saying with your body, but others will get the message. Make sure it’s the one you want to send.



Tree Stands Are Focus of Safety Campaign

All four of the non-firearms related fatalities reported last hunting season involved falls from a tree stand.

“Unfortunately, none of the victims wore a fall restraint system, which is strongly recommended by hunter education instructors,” Capt. Chris Huebner said. “The widow of one of the victims approached us about how she could help prevent the type of accident that killed her husband. We developed a TV spot using her in front of the camera, in her own words.”

It is one part of a media campaign to heighten awareness for hunters in using caution with tree stands. A feature article in the September issue of *Wildlife in North Carolina* magazine, by Bruce Ingram, highlights aspects of safe use.

“We also issued the ‘top five’ basic guidelines for tree stand safety in a news release,” Capt. Huebner said.

- Always wear a full body harness. This is the best precaution anyone can use.
- Maintain three points of contact (hands and feet) when climbing up or down.
- Never carry anything when climbing – use a haul line!
- Check all belts, chains and attachment cords before use.
- Avoid selecting a decaying or leaning tree, or a slippery-surfaced or smooth-bark tree.

URGENT!

National Archery in the Schools Program

The National Archery in the Schools Program in North Carolina is a joint venture between public schools and the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission. Efforts are underway to increase participation in the program.

The program promotes learning, fun, health and fitness, and participation in the lifelong sport of archery. Students shoot at bulls-eye targets in a gym, with special backdrops and safety restraints. Equipment used is state-of-the-art and designed to fit every student. Thanks to support from the archery industry, the \$6,000 equipment kits can be purchased by schools for \$2,800 to \$3,000. It is offered through physical education classes for grades 4-12. Core content covers archery history, safety, technique, mental concentration, physical fitness and self-improvement.

The best selling point is that archery is safe and there has never been an archery accident in NASP. The program builds math skills, teaches history and culture, stresses responsibility and encourages social interaction.
