

Wildlife Commission Extends Striped Bass Season until May 7

The Wildlife Commission has extended the striped bass harvest season within the Roanoke River Management Area until midnight on Sunday, May 7. The season had been set to expire by rule on April 30. The Roanoke River Management Area includes the Roanoke River and tributaries from Roanoke Rapids Lake Dam downstream to the mouth of the river at Albemarle Sound, including the Cashie, Middle and Eastmost rivers. Deer Harvest Report Shows 7.8 Percent Decrease From Previous Season

The Wildlife Commission's annual deer harvest report for the 2016-17 hunting season showed hunters across the state harvested 149,811 deer, which was a 7.8 percent decrease from the previous season and an 11.2 percent decrease from the 10-year average. Harvests declined across the state. More

Anglers who catch a tagged fish are asked to cut off the tag and report it online or call 1-800-682-2632. Recapture rewards and information about your tagged fish will be offered with any tag return.
