Wildlife Commission Seeks Public Comments on 2015 Wildlife Action Plan Addendum

Plants will be added to Species of Greatest Conservation Need

RALEIGH, N.C. (April 20, 2022) – The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission is seeking public comments through May 20 on a major revision to the 2015 Wildlife Action Plan that will add plants to the list of North Carolina's Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SCCN). The addendum documents and comment portal are available online.

Addendum 2 to the Plan will add plant SGCN as a component of the state's natural communities, add a new natural community description for Piedmont and Coastal Plain Oak Forests, and provide habitat associations between plant SGCN and the natural communities described in the Plan.

The addendum is in preparation for the anticipated passage of the Recovering America's Wildlife Act (RAWA), proposed federal legislation with wide bi-partisan support, which will include provisions for plant conservation. As currently proposed, RAWA will provide a new source of federal matching grant funds to states that include plants as SGCN in their Wildlife Action Plans. The Wildlife Commission will join 15 other state wildlife agencies that already include plants in their Wildlife Action Plans.

"Conservation is critical to preserve genetic diversity and seed sources, especially for rare plants limited to small, isolated or fragmented populations," said Cindy Simpson, the Wildlife Commission's Wildlife Action Plan coordinator. "In comparison to wildlife species that are able to move across the landscape, plants are at greater risk to direct impacts from threats because they are rooted within their landscape position."

The Wildlife Commission developed Addendum 2 through collaboration with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Plant Conservation Program and the N.C. Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, Natural Heritage Program.

"Plant species represent a very large proportion of our state's total biodiversity," said Lesley Starke, program administrator for the NC Plant Conservation Program at the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. "Adding plants into the Wildlife Action Plan will expand the scope and impact of this conservation strategy. By identifying conservation needs and enacting conservation programs earlier for at-risk species, we hope to reduce the need to list species."

"Adding plants to the list of SGCN will help promote wider recognition of the role of native plants in wildlife habitats and will help increase federal funding for plant conservation in North Carolina," said Misty Buchanan, deputy director for Natural Heritage Program. "This habitat-based approach will benefit native plants, wildlife, and the habitat that supports them."

The N.C. Plant Conservation Program manages plant conservation in the state, including adopting a state list of protected plant species, adopting and enforcing regulations that protect, conserve and enhance those listed species, and developing conservation programs for the benefit of listed species. The Plant Conservation Program is also responsible for managing more than 14,500 acres of conservation preserve properties across the state which provide critical conservation for listed plant species in North Carolina.

The N.C. Natural Heritage Program maintains a statewide inventory of native plant species that are rare, in decline, believed to have been extirpated or presumed extinct. The Natural Heritage Program works with the Plant Conservation Program to maintain inventory information on plant species that are listed as Endangered, Threatened, Special Concern or Significantly Rare. The

inventory is maintained with current data and an updated <u>Rare Plant List</u> is published every two years.

About the N.C. Wildlife Action Plan

The 2015 N.C. Wildlife Action Plan is a non-regulatory program that identifies fish and wildlife Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) and other species for which there are research or management priorities. In North Carolina, SGCN have been defined as species that are currently rare or have been designated as at-risk of extinction; those for which we have knowledge deficiencies; and those that have not received adequate conservation attention in the past. The conservation priorities outlined in the Plan allows the Wildlife Commission and conservation partners statewide to consider management options within essential habitats that support conservation.

About the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission

Since 1947, the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission has been dedicated to the conservation and sustainability of the state's fish and wildlife resources through research, scientific management, wise use and public input. The Commission is the state regulatory agency responsible for the enforcement of fishing, hunting, trapping and boating laws and provides programs and opportunities for wildlife-related educational, recreational and sporting activities.



Q2 Are you familiar with the NC Wildlife Action Plan?



6	I am writing as a propagator of native plants. I collect seed from my property and that of my neighbors, with their permission. I live in a rural location in the mountains in western NC. Over the last 20 years that I have lived in this location, I have seen a decline in bio-diversity and a decline in the populations of various species of flora and fauna. The bumble bees are one of the most obvious examples. I have seen people remove Spicebush because they think they have no landscape value. Spicebush not only produces the Spicebush Swallowtail butterfly, but it is also an indicator of Ginseng habitat. And Ginseng has all been poached out of this neighborhood. The poachers I used to see don't come here anymore! I have seen a neighbor remove, with a dozer, all of the vegetation along 1/2 mile of stream bank, on both sides, going back approx. 100 feet on each side. He didn't like the Rhododendron maximum that covered the slopes and held the earth in place. Every time it rains now, his run-off silts up the fish hatcheries of his down stream neighbor. In the past few years we have had a large influx of people move in from urban areas and they are busy recreating the urban/suburban yards they left behind, even if its 10 acres large, or more: constant mowing, blowing and spraying. The utility companies and the NCDOT are doing the same thing to keep up with the growing needs of the community in all their ROWs, even when a fair number of property owners are willing and capable of maintaining their own, given permission and guidelines. Where are the hedgerows that used to grow up between fields and along the roads? There is no selectivity to what they destroy. We also have a lot of new "farmers", keeping a few animals for fun or to reduce their taxes, or trying to produce their own food. They are given concessions and permission to destroy wildlife habitat, to overgraze their pastures, degrade the stream beds and water quality by allowing livestock in the streams.
