Urban Archery Deer Season (open in participating cities only- refer to the <i>Regulations Digest</i> for a list and contact information)	Archery Only:	Jan. 11 – Feb. 16, 2020
Youth Deer Hunting Day On this day, youth under the age of 18 may use any legal weapon to hunt deer of either-sex. Refer to the <i>Regulations Digest</i> for a description of legal weapons. Youth ages 16 and 17 must be properly licensed to hunt deer.	Any Legal Weapon:	Sept. 28, 2019
