

#### Wildlife Commission Sets Regulations for 2018-19 Seasons

The Wildlife Commission voted yesterday to adopt rules related to wildlife, fisheries, and game lands management for the 2018-19 seasons. The effective date for these changes is Aug. 1, 2018. Wildlife Commissioners carefully weighed public comments regarding the cultural and traditional impacts of proposed deer season changes, as well as biological information, and adopted modified rules. ### 2017 Striped Bass Season on Roanoke River Opens March 1

The Wildlife Commission will open the entire Roanoke River Management Area to striped bass harvest from March 1 through April 30. The daily creel limit within the Management Area is two striped bass per angler. The minimum length limit is 18 inches, and no striped bass between 22 and 27 inches can be possessed at any time. Only one striped bass larger than 27 inches can be included in the daily creel limit. MORE

## Hatchery Supported Trout Waters Closed to Fishing March 1 until April 7

The Wildlife Commission will close approximately 1,000 miles of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters to fishing one-half hour after sunset on Feb. 28 and reopen them at 7 a.m. on April 7. While fishing is closed, Commission personnel will stock all Hatchery Supported Trout Waters in preparation for opening day. MORE

# Wildlife Commissioners Sign Resolution on Sunday Hunting of Migratory Birds

The N.C. General Assembly, through Session Law 2017-182, granted the Wildlife Resources Commission authority to promulgate rules legalizing hunting on Sunday for wild animals (including migratory birds) and upland game birds. In addition, the law also directed the Commission to "complete a study that includes, but is not limited to, examining biological and resource management impacts, economic impacts, and social impacts associated with hunting migratory birds on Sunday." To complete this study, the Commission contracted with Responsive Management to determine the economic and social impacts while Commission biologists evaluated the biological and resource management impacts. The results of the study were presented to the Commission on Feb. 27. After reviewing the study, the Wildlife Commissioners adopted a resolution, which directs agency staff to examine in greater detail the social, economic and biological impacts of Sunday hunting on migratory birds before taking any additional actions. #### Wildlife Commission Approves Coyote Management Plan

The Wildlife Commissioners approved the Coyote Management Plan at their board meeting in Raleigh today. The 200-page plan provides biological information on coyotes in North Carolina, identifies concerns about coyotes, outlines the challenges of coyote control and provides strategies to minimize impacts of coyotes.
